# Focus on eczema

TRAINING FOR THE PHARMACY TEAM

Eczema – also known as dermatitis – is a very common dry skin condition with a prevalence of up to **5%** (in children and young adults approximately **10%**).<sup>1</sup>

Eczema is a chronic, relapsing skin condition that causes the skin to become itchy, red, dry and cracked. Living with eczema can be deeply distressing and a real challenge to manage.

Eczema cannot be cured, but there are ways to help a sufferer manage the condition and its flare-ups. It is important that the pharmacy team can recognise eczema and understand the impact it can have on someone's life, and how they can offer the best advice for flare-up management.



# Effective conversations

To truly make a difference to customers with eczema, we must first make an effort to understand them. In the pharmacy we often see the physical symptoms of skin conditions like eczema, but we don't always consider the emotional impact they may have on sufferers and how they may be affecting their daily lives. It is important that the pharmacy team understands these worries and offers appropriate support when giving advice.













To help you develop your confidence in conversations with customers, we will use a familiar questioning tool to show you how you can put your knowledge into practice.

# Who suffers from eczema?

Eczema is most common among children but often improves significantly, or even clears completely, as they get older. However, the condition can continue into adulthood and can sometimes develop for the first time in adults.



# What are the symptoms?





Skin is a barrier made of water, protein, lipids and minerals that protect our body from the external environment. Intercellular lipids play a crucial role in this.

Eczema skin



In eczema sufferers the skin's protective barrier is reduced due to breakdown of the intercellular lipids, causing:

- A loss of moisture, which dries the skin
- Skin to become vulnerable to external irritants and allergens. This can lead to inflammation resulting in scaly, red, itchy skin



Eczema is a highly individual condition which varies from person to person and comes in many different forms. Atopic eczema and contact eczema are the two most common types.



#### Commonly occurs in areas with skin folds




#### Contact eczema

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# Living with eczema

The symptoms of eczema can have a major psychological impact on sufferers as well as a physical one. For example, the scratching associated with eczema can disrupt sleep and often make itching worse, resulting in a vicious cycle of itching and regular scratching.

This vicious cycle can lead to sleepless nights, and affect a person's ability to concentrate at work or school. As a result, customers may come into the pharmacy displaying signs of being very distressed and the empathy shown by you will make a huge difference to them and their wellbeing.



Refer a customer to the pharmacist or their GP when they report their condition is worsening (spreading to other areas, thickened areas of skin) or any of the following:

- There are signs of infection (redness, swelling, inflammation, fever, pus filled blisters, crusting)
- Eczema is not responding to current treatment or there is an increase in flare-up frequency or size of area affected
- If you have concerns on the psychological impact of eczema on the sufferer

## Real life case study:

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As a mother, it's been difficult watching Maya scratch at her skin since she was born. Nearly two years later and despite several attempts, we were no further to finding effective relief for her.

# How long have you had the symptoms for?



Pharmacy staff can make a difference by helping customers identify potential triggers which worsen their symptoms.

#### Contact eczema

Inflammation of the skin occurs when you come into contact with a particular substance. It can be caused by:

- An irritant: a substance that directly damages the outer layer of skin e.g:
  - Detergents
  - Perfumes/preservatives in cosmetics
  - · Oils used in machines
  - Cement powders, dust and soil
  - Water
  - Plants
- An allergen: a substance that causes the immune system to respond in a way that affects the skin e.g:
  - Cosmetic ingredients
  - Metals such as nickel
  - Rubber, latex
  - Textiles

Contact eczema caused by irritants is more common, causing up to 8 in every 10 cases<sup>5</sup>



Think about your customer's occupation too, as their contact eczema may be linked to this. This type of dermatitis is more common in certain occupations, including: agricultural workers, beauticians and hairdressers, chemical/metal/electronic/construction workers, cleaners, cooks or health workers.

<sup>\*</sup> The amount of cream to use is sometimes given in fingertip units (FTUs), which is measured from the tip of an adult finger to the first crease of the finger. The recommended dosage in terms of FTUs will depend on what part of the body is being treated, for example 1 FTU for the hands, elbow and knees and 8 FTUs for the legs.

<sup>\*\*</sup> Age restrictions for steroids include age 10 and over for hydrocortisone and age 12 and over for clobetasone butyrate.

# Are you taking any other **M**edicines?

If the customer is taking any medication – either prescribed or over the counter (including herbal products) – you should refer them to the pharmacist. Certain medicines may trigger eczema flare-ups and the pharmacist will be able to discuss this with the customer.

Remember to ask your customer if they are using any medication for their eczema, such as a corticosteroid. Note: Dermalex Eczema can be used alongside other treatments.



Discuss with your pharmacist when to refer a customer to them based on the particular medicines they might be taking and list those medicines below:

#### Real life case study:

# Tips and advice

You may have customers who are embarrassed about their condition and will not readily approach you, which is why it is important to look out for signs where you need to be more proactive and approach customers yourself. These could include:

- Customers spending a lot of time at the eczema fixture, looking confused
- Customers looking at certain products for a long time.

If you need to start a conversation, you could try one of these helpful introductions:

- I notice you've been looking at these treatments would you like some more information about them?
- Is there anything in particular you were looking for?
- Would you like to go into the consultation room to discuss things?



Customers may need extra advice on newer treatments like Dermalex as they may not be sure how they work or if they will be effective. By communicating well with customers and being knowledgeable about eczema and how it can be managed, they are much more likely to trust you and be responsive to your advice.
